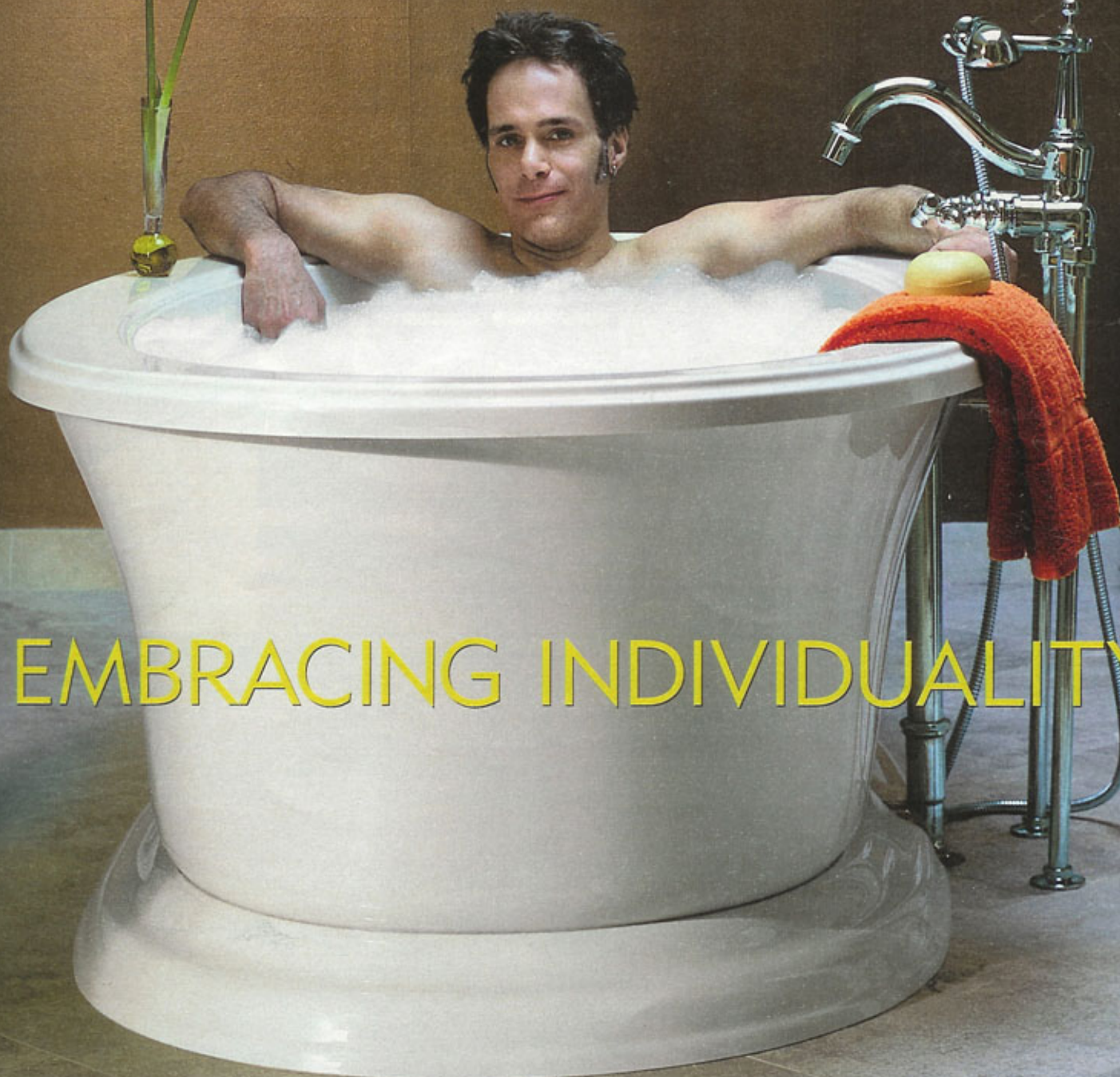

OCCASIONAL TABLES THAT DO MORE THAN JUST STAND AROUND



1 THE SURFACE-SHIFTER: The Par 4 Table has a wenge-stained Iroko wood frame and a laminate top that flips from a white to a beige surface. Four movable leaves create various shapes and sizes. \$1,395 at Design Within Reach, Chicago.

2 THE ELEVATOR: The Camelo dining/side/coffee table by Espasso can be raised or lowered to three different heights, and comes in five different diameters, making its Imbuia wood or glass surface suitable for various ventures. \$1,335 to \$2,840 at Abode, Chicago.

3 THE STASH-ALL: Fat-Fat and Lady Fat by Patricia Urquiola for B&B Italia can be used as tables or stools, and are hollow inside to provide storage space. The frame comes covered in a synthetic fabric, felt, or leather and various tops are available. \$1,425 and up, at Luminaire, Chicago.

4 THE DO-IT-ALL: Offi's molded plywood Mag table is a side table or stool, stores magazines and can flip on its side to become a laptop stand or TV table. It comes in three finishes (birch, walnut or black) for ultimate coordination. \$129 to \$159 depending on finish at www.offi.com.

5 THE SHOWOFF: Collectibles have somewhere to go, and books and papers have somewhere to stay put on the reproduction Gregori Warchavchik 1930s circular table. Shown in Imbuia; 11 other options are available. \$3,475 at Abode, Chicago.
